I tender herewith the report of my administration as Director of the Courts of the State for the calendar year 1970, together with the statistical tables reflecting the business of all courts of the state.

In spite of greater numbers of cases being filed in all categories, $I$ am happy to report that the flexibility of our unified court system has permitted us to keep abreast of the work-load without any appreciable increase in the number of judgeships. Credit for much of this success must be given to the practice of assigning judges from areas with light work-loads to hold court wherever their services are needed. This constitutional power of the Chief Justice, exercised by me as Director of the Administrative Office, has permitted us to utilize the services of all judges in the state operating as a unit in what is truly a unified State Court System.

This is a factual report of how the Judicial System in Illinois operated in 1970.

## NEW CONSTITUTION FOR ILLINOIS

On December 15, 1970 the Illinois electorate adopted a new Constitution which replaces the State's 1870 Constitution, as amended. The new charter becomes effective July 1, 1971. Under the old Constitution, the Judicial Article, which was completely revised and updated in January 1964, provided Illinois with a truly unified trial court system; the 1970 Constitution retains the unified court structure, cures defects and refines other areas which, after seven years of experience, were found to be insusceptible to implementation.

The Constitution retains essentially the best of the old Judicial Article while modernizing archaic concepts which do not lend themselves to today's for-ward-looking society. For example, the new Judicial Article maintains the flexible yet structurally sound unified trial court system which was pioneered in Ilinois. In this unique system, every trial judge has the same jurisdiction which forecloses the possibility of a suit being filed in the wrong court. Every trial judge is a judge of the circuit court and can be assigned to duty in any trial court in the State.

Some of the important changes which affect the judiciary and court procedure mandated by the 1970 Constitution are:

1. No person shall be held to answer for a crime punishable by death or imprisonment in the penitentiary unless he is indicted by a grand jury or given a prompt preliminary hearing-Art. I, Sec. 7.
2. No person shall be imprisoned for failure to pay a fine in a criminal case unless he has been given adequate time to make payment, in installments if necessary-Art. I, Sec. 14.
3. In the event the General Assembly and a Legislative Redistricting Commission cannot devise an agreeable plan for redistricting legislative districts as based on the federal census, then the Supreme Court shall select two persons, one of whom will be randomly selected to serve on the Commission. The Supreme Court shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction over actions concerning re-districting-Art. IV, Sec. 3.
4. The Supreme Court shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to review a law which specifies the procedures by which the ability of the Governor to serve in office is questioned and determined. In the absence of a law, the Supreme Court shall make the determination of the Governor's ability to serve under rules the Court may adopt.Art. V, Sec. 6.
5. The Supreme Court will be constitutionally required to exercise its appellate jurisdiction only in two areas: (a) appeals from judgments of the trial
court imposing the death sentence; (b) appeals from the Appellate Court where a question under the Federal or State Constitution arises for the first time in and as a result of the Appellate Court's action or if the Appellate Court files a certificate of importance. The Supreme Court can provide by rule for appeals in other cases-Art. VI, Sec. 4.

Under the old Constitution, litigants in certain cases had the rigt of direct appeal from the trial court to the Supreme Court. These appeals created a crushing caseload on the Court and left little time for the Court to consider its administrative duties. Now, the Court will have the authority to bring its caseload within manageable limits and be able to devote the necessary time to administering the State's courts.
6. Each of the State's 102 counties must have at least one circuit judge, unless otherwise provided by law-Art. VI, Sec. 7.

Heretofore, it was required that there be at least one elected judge from each county; now, the legislature may abolish (by attrition) the "one county one judge" requirement.
7. The appointed judiciary-the associate judges -continue to be appointed by the circuit judges but as provided by Supreme Court Rule. Formerly, the appointed judiciary was selected in accordance with procedures established by the various circuit courts. The new associate judges also will have fouryear tenure, rather than serving at the circuit judge's pleasure-Art. VI, Sec. 8 and 10.
8. A vacancy occurring in the office of Supreme, Appellate or Circuit Judge shall be filled as provided by law ; in absence of a law, the Supreme Court may fill the vacancy by appointment-Art. VI, Sec. 12.

Prior to July 1, there was no provision for filling vacancies occurring between elections.
9. A judge who was initially elected to office may seek retention for the office by "running on his record' as opposed to running against an opponent; however, the new Constitution increases the percentage of affirmative votes from $50 \%$ to $60 \%$-Art. VI, Sec. 12.
10. Disciplinary proceedings against judges will be now bifurcated. Heretofore, the Illinois Courts Commission, composed of one Supreme Court judge, two Appellate Court judges and two circuit judges, was the sole body with authority to receive complaints, investigate, prosecute and adjudicate allegations of judicial misconduct. The 1970 Constitution, while retaining the Courts Commission as an adjudicatory body, creates a Judicial Inquiry Board, composed of two circuit judges appointed by the the Supreme Court and seven others appointed by the Governor, three of whom must be lawyers. The Board has au-
thority to conduct investigations, receive and initiate complaints, and file complaints with the Courts Com-mission-Art. VI, See. 15.
11. The Clerks of the Supreme and Appellate Courts shall be appointed by their respective courts —Art. VI, Sec. 18.

Formerly, the clerks were selected by the electorate.
12. Under the new Constitution, home rule units are granted broad powers including the power to punish by imprisonment for up to six months; however, the unit does not have the power to define and provide for the punishment of a felony-Art. VII, Sec. 6.

It is anticipated that the Local Government Article, which authorizes home rule units, will be a major source of litigation in Illinois in the coming years due to the novelty of and the State's inexperience with the home rule powers which heretofore had been in the main vested in the State government.
13. Officers of townships, school districts, special districts and units which are designated as units of local government, shall not be appointed by the judiciary-Art. VII, Sec. 8 and Transition Schedule, Sec. 4.

The new Constitution abolishes the non-judicial function of judges appointing officers to drainage, light, road districts, etc.
14. Each person has the right to a healthful environment, and he may enforce the right against any party, governmental or private, through appropriate legal proceedings-Art. XI, Sec. 2.
15. Sovereign immunity is abolished except as the legislature may provide by law-Art. XIII, Sec. 4.

Unless the legislature provides otherwise, claims against the State will be adjudicated in the circuit court rather than the legislature's quasi-judicial Court of Claims.

## TO THE HONORABLE CHIEF JUSTICE AND JUSTICES OF THE SUPREME COURT OF ILLINOIS

This annual report of the Administrative Office covers a summary of judicial developments occurring during 1970, and forms a permanent record of the activities of this office in its administrative responsibilities to the judicial system of the State of Illinois and its 635 judicial officers.

Over 2,000 copies of this report are distributed in the United States and foreign countries. Copies are studied by judges and court administrators who are seeking to improve their judicial systems to the level achieved in Illinois. In addition, they are used
by students, law schools, citizens' groups, the news media and other interested parties who are seeking, in an ever increasing number, knowledge on the operation of our court system. Files of judicial annual reports from many states are maintained in public libraries for study and research projects by students.

## LEGISLATIVE

The Administrative Office has been designated by the Supreme Court to act as legislative liaison for the judiciary. A close working relationship is maintained with the Judicial Advisory Council of the General Assembly.

A mutual exchange of information on legislation affecting courts continues to be an important function of this office. The Governor's office, Legislative Reference Bureau and individual members of the legislature are among those seeking information on bills affecting the Illinois courts.

A weekly synopsis of all bills affecting the court is prepared during sessions of the legislature, and copies are sent to the Supreme Court and other members of the judiciary.
Legislation affecting the courts signed into law in 1970 :
H.B. 3320. Amends Section 2 of an Act relating to circuit courts. Provides for election of one additional circuit judge in any circuit composed of 2 counties having a total population of 350,000 or more.
H.B. 3777. Adds Section to an Act relating to the circuit courts. Provides for one additional circuit judge under certain conditions.
S.B. 1534. Appropriates $\$ 45,000$ to the Supreme Court for payment of transcription fees.
H.B. 3819. Amends the Governor's Official Traffic Safety Coordinating Committee Act. Adds Director of the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts to the committee.

## JUDICIAL RETIREMENTS AND RESIGNATIONS

A total of twenty-one appellate and circuit judges resigned during 1970. The twenty-one judges had served a total of 483 years on the bench. Their individual experience ranged from ten to forty-nine years.

Resignations were also accepted by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court from four magistrates during 1970.

## JUDICIARY ACTIVITIES

## Supreme Court

The Honorable Robert C. Underwood was se-
lected by his fellow justices as Chief Justice for a three year term commencing in January 1970. Chief Justice Underwood had been serving in that capacity since August 2, 1969 and has been a member of the court since 1962.

During 1970 the Supreme Court rendered full opinions on 345 cases, disposed of 87 petitions for rehearing, 344 petitions for leave to appeal and 1258 motions of various other types; motions presented to individual justices during times when the court was not in session totaled 1941.

Significant increases have occurred during the past year in the Court's caseload. Opinions rendered increased $49 \%$ over 1969 with the overall workload continuing to be extremely high. In addition, the Court spends many hours carrying out its constitutional responsibility for the administration of all courts in Illinois. These administrative duties charged to the court are exercised through the Chief Justice and aided in supervisory control by the Administrative Director and staff.

In November of 1970, three justices were elected to the Supreme Court to fill vacancies created by death or resignation.

The new justices sworn in on December 7, 1970 are: Charles H. Davis (Rockford), Howard C. Ryan (Tonica), and Joseph H. Goldenhersh (East St. Louis). Justice Davis previously served on the court from 1955 to 1960, and preceding his election, served as a justice of the 2nd District Appellate Court; Justice Ryan served on the 3rd District Appellate Court and Justice Goldenhersh with the 5th District Appellate Court.

On January 30th, 1970, the Supreme Court adopted a new code of ethics and regulations for Illinois judges (see appendix). The new ethics and regulations were presented to the Court by a seven man committee chaired by the Dean of the University of Illinois Law School. The Court appointed committee had described its recommendations as the most comprehensive and stringent of any judicial system in the United States.

Under its rule-making powers, the Supreme Court also provided new rules setting out standards for plea bargaining in criminal cases. The major change in the rule requires all plea bargaining to be conducted on the record.

The Court appointed committees to study and recommend changes in criminal discovery and quasicriminal litigation rules, and a criminal justice programs committee, the later is to act as a conduit for Law Enforcement Assistance Administration funds and is responsible for reviewing and coordinating grant fund programs affecting the judiciary or court related personnel.

## Appellate Court

The five Appellate Court districts in Illinois during 1970 again carried an ever increasing caseload commensurate with the increase in volume of lower court litigation.

In November of 1970, an additional division of three judges was elected to the 1st District Appellate Court in Cook County. This increased the court to five divisions. The 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th appellate districts continued to have single three judge divisions, with additional judges assigned on a temporary basis when needed.

Appellate judges from the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Districts heard and rendered 66 written opinions in cases arising in the First District to help relieve that district of its pending caseload.

## Circuit Court

The widespread use of assignment powers vested in the Supreme Court, and implemented by the Administrative Director, continued to be a major factor in the efficient utilization of judicial manpower in Illinois. Temporary shortages in several circuits were alleviated by assignment of judges to circuits other than those in which they were elected to serve.

A total of 57 circuit and associate circuit judges were assigned to Cook County for a total of 757 days, and 36 magistrates were assigned for a total of 455 days. Assignments to the 20 circuits other than Cook County totaled 455 days for 75 circuit and associate circuit judges.

Cook County's summer pre-trial program of personal injury cases was continued during 1970, aided by the assignment of downstate judges to conduct jury trials during the months of July and August. This program executed by the court in cooperation with insurance carriers and members of the bar continues to dispose of a large number of pending cases during the formerly non-productive summer months.

## Appendix

## Rule 61. Standards of Judicial Conduct (Effective March 15, 1970)

(a) Definitions.
(1) Wherever the word "judge" is used in the Standards and Rules it includes circuit and associate judge and judges of the appellate and Supreme Court.
(2) Wherever the pronoun "he" is used in the Standards and Rules it includes the feminine as well as the masculine form.
(b) Preamble. The assumption of the office of judge imposes upon the incumbent duties in respect to
his personal conduct which concern his relation to the State and its inhabitants, the litigants before him, the principles of law, the practitioners of law in his court, and the witnesses, jurors and attendants who aid him in the administration of its functions. In every particular his conduct should be above reproach. He should be conscientious, studious, thorough, courteous, patient, punctual, just, impartial, fearless of public clamor, regardless of public praise, and immune from private, political or partisan pressures. He should administer justice according to law, and deal with his appointments as a public trust. He should not allow other affairs or his private interests to interfere with the prompt and proper performance of his judicial duties, nor should he administer the office for the purpose of advancing his personal ambitions or increasing his popularity.

## (c) Standards.

(1) The Integrity of Our Legal System. A judge should bear in mind that ours is a government of law and not of men and that his duty is the application of general law to particular instances. He should administer the office with due regard to the integrity of the system of the law itself, remembering that he is not a depositary of arbitrary power, but a judge under the law.
(2) The Public Interest. Courts exist to promote justice, and thus to serve the public interest. Their administration should be speedy and careful. Every judge should at all times be alert in his rulings and in the conduct of the court.
(3) Constitutional Obligations. It is the duty of all judges to support the Federal and applicable State constitutions; in doing so, they should fearlessly observe and apply fundamental limitations and guarantees.
(4) Avoidance of Impropriety. A judge's official conduct should be free from impropriety ; he should avoid infractions of law; and his personal behavior, not upon the Bench and the performance of judicial duties, but also in his everyday life, should be beyond reproach.
(5) Essential Conduct. A judge should be temperate, industrious, attentive, patient, impartial, studious of the principles of the law and diligent in endeavoring to ascertain the facts. He shall devote full time to his judicial duties and shall normally conduct morning and afternoon sessions of court for hearing and deciding matters regularly assigned to him.
(6) Promptness. A judge should be prompt in the performance of his judicial duties. He
should recognize that the time of litigants, jurors and attorneys is of value and that habitual lack of punctuality or diligence creates dissatisfaction with the administration of the court.
(7) Court Organization. A judge responsible for administration should organize the court with a view to the prompt and convenient dispatch of its business. No judge should tolerate abuses or neglect by clerks and other assistants.

All judges should co-operate to promote the satisfactory administration of justice.

It is the duty of a judge to hear and decide all matters regularly assigned to him except in those cases in which he has a conflict of interest.
(8) Consideration for Counsel and Others. A judge should be considerate of, and courteous to, counsel, especially the young and inexperienced, jurors, witnesses, and others in attendance upon the court.

He should also require and, so far as his power extends, enforce, on the part of the court personnel and counsel, civility and courtesy to the court, to other counsel, and to jurors, witnesses, litigants and others having business in the court.
(9). Special Responsibility in Crowded Courtrooms. In courts having a large volume of cases, tending to crowd the courtrooms, the judge should give serious and careful attention to all decisions, and should take special care to enforce reasonable order and decorum.
(10) Unprofessional Conduct of Attorneys. A judge should criticize or discipline with prudence unprofessional conduct of attorneys in matters pending before him, and if such action is not a sufficient corrective, should refer the matter to the proper authorities.
(11) Appointees of the Judiciary and Their Compensation. All appointments in judicial proceedings should be made on an impartial basis, with a view of selecting competent persons of good moral character. A judge should avoid nepotism and action tending to create suspicion of impropriety. He should not offend against the spirit of this standard by interchanging appointments with other judges, or by any other device. He should receive and consider suggestions of counsel in proceedings with respect to the appointments of trustees, receivers, guardians and other persons, but should not permit this choice to
be improperly influenced, nor his free judgment to be impaired. He should not make unauthorized or unnecessary appointments. While not hesitating to set or approve just amounts a judge should be most scrupulous in granting or approving compensation for services of appointees so as to avoid excessive allowances, whether or not the same be excepted to or complained of. He cannot rid himself of this responsibility by consent of counsel.
(12) Self-Interest and Freedom from Influence. A judge should neither perform nor take part in any judicial act in which his personal interests or those of a relative are involved. He should not allow any person to influence him improperly or enjoy his favor; he should not be affected by the kinship, rank, position or influence of any litigant or other person and he should not convey the impression by his conduct that he can be so influenced or affected.
(13) Independence. A judge should not be swayed by partisan demands, public clamor, considerations of personal popularity or notoriety, nor permit fear or unjust criticism to influence his judicial action.
(14) Interference in Conduct of Trial. A judge should so direct the trial of a case as to prevent unnecessary waste of time but he should bear in mind that his undue interference, impatience, or participation in the examination of witnesses, or a severe attitude on his part toward witnesses, especially those who are excited or terrified by the unusual circumstances of a trial, may tend to prevent the proper presentation of the cause, or the ascertainment of the truth in respect thereto.

The judge should avoid controversies with counsel which are apt to obscure the merits of the dispute between litigants and lead to its unjust disposition. In addressing counsel, litigants, or witnesses, he should avoid a controversial manner or tone. He should give careful attention to the arguments of counsel and should avoid unnecessary interruptions.
(15) Ex Parte Hearings. In proceedings where an ex parte hearing is proper, a judge should act only when he is convinced, after a careful examination of the facts and principles of law on which the application is based, that the facts and the law require such action.
(16) Ex Parte Communications. Except as per-
mitted by law, a judge should not permit private or ex parte interviews, arguments or communications designed to influence his judicial action in any case, either civil or criminal.

A judge should not accept in any case briefs, documents or written communications intended or calculated to influence his action unless the contents are promptly made known to all parties.
(17) Continuances. In considering applications for continuances, a judge, without forcing unreasonably or unjustly to trial, should insist upon a proper observance by counsel of their duties to their clients and to adverse parties and their counsel, so as to expedite the disposition of matters before the court.
(18) Sentences and Punishments. In imposing sentence, a judge should follow the law and should not compel persons brought before him to submit to some act or discipline without authority of law, whether or not he may think it would have a beneficial corrective influence. He should endeavor to conform to a reasonable standard of punishment and should not seek popularity or publicity either by exceptional severity or by undue leniency.
(19) Review. A trial judge should promptly certify the report of proceedings on timely application if it fully and fairly presents the questions as they arose at the trial.
(20) Legislation. A judge has exceptional opportunity to observe the operation of statutes, especially those relating to practice, and to ascertain whether they tend to expedite or impede the just disposition of controversies. Where it is clear that he might contribute to the public welfare, he should advise those in authority of his observation and experience in order that they may remedy defects of procedure.
(21) Inconsistent Obligations. A judge should not accept duties or obligations which will interfere, or reasonably appear to interfere, with the proper performance of his official duties.
(22) Gifts and Favors. A judge should not accept gifts or favors from litigants, lawyers practicing before him, or others whose causes are likely to be submitted to him for judgment.
(23) Social Relations. A judge should be particularly careful to avoid any action that
tends reasonably to arouse the suspicion that his social or business relations or friendships influence his judicial conduct.
(24) Improper Publicizing of Court Proceedings. Proceedings in court should be conducted with fitting dignity and decorum. The taking of photographs in the courtroom during sessions of the court or recesses between proceedings detract from the essential dignity of the sessions, and the broadcasting or televising of court proceedings, distract participants and witnesses in giving testimony, and create misconceptions with respect thereto in the mind of the public and should not be permitted.
(25) Conduct of Court Proceedings. Proceedings in court should be so conducted as to reflect their importance and seriousness. Judicial robes should be worn whenever practicable.

## Rule 62. Violations of Standards (Adopted effective March 15, 1971)

A judge who consistently violates the Standards of Judicial Conduct shall be subject to discipline by the Courts Commission. The Standards, due to their general terms, may be inadvertently violated on occasion by a judge and such conduct may be too insignificant to call for official action. A consistent pattern of violation, however, will subject the offender to discipline by the Commission.

## Rule 63. Business Activities (Effective January 1, 1971)

A judge shall not assume an active role in the management of any business or serve as an officer or director of any for-profit corporation. The rule is not intended to prohibit personal investments. If a judge does not neglect his judicial duties in so doing, he may engage in the activities usually incident to the ownership of investment property and may also serve as an officer or director of a not-for-profit corporation. This rule shall become effective January 1, 1971.

Rule 64. Other Prohibited Activities. (Adopted effective March 15, 1970)
A judge shall not (a) accept duties or obligations which will interfere, or reasonably appear to interfere, with the proper performance of his official duties; or (b) give grounds for reasonable suspicion that he is using the power or prestige of his office to persuade or influence others to patronize or contribute to the success of any business; or (c) solicit or permit his name to be used in any manner to solicit funds for any purpose, charitable or otherwise. A
judge should not allow his name to appear on the letterhead of any organization where the stationery is used to solicit contributions, and he should not permit any clerk, bailiff, or attache of his office to solicit on his behalf for any purpose, charitable or otherwise.

## Rule 65. Compensation for Nonjudicial Service. (Effective January 1, 1971)

A judge shall not accept compensation of any kind, whether in the form of loans, gifts, gratuities, or otherwise for service hereafter performed or to be performed by him except as provided by law for the performance of his judicial duties or as provided by the Illinois constitution; however, a judge may accept reasonable compensation for lecturing, teaching, writing or similar activities. This rule shall become effective January 1, 1971.

## Rule 66. Disqualification for and Disclosure of Financial Conflicts of Interest. (Adopted effective March 15, 1970)

A judge, a soon as practicable, shall disqualify himself in any case if (a) he or members of his immediate family (spouse or minor children residing with him) have any substantial financial interest in the result of any ruling or decision therein or (b) if he or members of his immediate family have any substantial financial interest in any corporation or business which is a party in said matter or which is identified as provided in this Rule as having a substantial, direct or indirect interest in the outcome of the litigation. If a judge has any financial interest in any corporation which is a party to the litigation or is identified as having an interest therein, which he believes to be too insubstantial to require disqualification, he shall make a full disclosure of such interest to the parties. In any case in which there are persons or corporations, not parties of record, who have a substantial, direct or indirect, financial interest in its outcome, each party may, within 60 days of the filing of his initial pleading, file a document identifying those persons or corporations. It shall be the duty of the clerk of the court to bring any such document which has been filed to the attention of any judge before whom that case is being heard.

## Rule 67. Disqualification for Other Conflicts of Interest. (Adopted effective March 15, 1970)

A judge shall disqualify himself in any case in which a close relative by blood or marriage (first, second or third degree of relationship under the rules of the civil law, see Ill. Rev. Stat. 1967, ch. 3, par. 11, subpar. 7) is a party, has an interest, or appears as counsel. Disqualification is required where a lineal descendant or ascendant, brother, sister, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece or spouse thereof is involved.

While a judge should disqualify himself in virtually all cases where a relative by blood or marriage is a party, has an interest, or appears as counsel, this may create an unnecessary hardship if the degree of relationship is remote. Although those relationships beyond the third degree are too remote to cause automatic disqualification, more distant relationships should be disclosed to the parties if they involve any possible conflict of interest. He shall not participate in any case in which he has previously acted as counsel. He shall not accept any fiduciary duties after January, 1971, or continue to administer or hold any fiduciary position or position of trust except for those involving his own family.

## Rule 68. Declarations of Economic Interest.* (Adopted effective March 15, 1970)

A judge shall file annually with the Director of the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts (1) a sealed, verified written statement of economic interests and relationships of himself and members of his immediate family and (2) an unsealed, verified written list of the names of the corporation and other businesses in which he or members of his immediate family have a financial interest. These sealed statements shall be opened only by the Supreme Court or by the Illinois Courts Commission when specifically authorized by the Supreme Court for use in proceedings of the Commission. The statements and lists shall be placed by the Director in

[^0]safekeeping. He shall not permit access to these documents or disclose the contents thereof except by Supreme Court order or as provided by this Rule. The specific form of the statements and lists and the time and manner of filing them will be as provided for by administrative order.

Within 30 days after an order has been entered in any case, any party may request information as to whether the most recent unsealed list of the judge entering that order contains the name of any specific persons or corporation or other business which is a party to the case or which is identified under the provisions of Rule 66 as having a substantial, direct or indirect, financial interest in its outcome. Neither the making of the request nor the contents thereof shall be revealed by the Director to any judge or other person except at the instance of the individual making the request. If the request meets the requirements of this Rule, the Director shall answer promptly. Requests shall be verified and filed with the Director in substantially the following form:

## Rule 69. Powers of Appointment. (Adopted effective Marc h 15, 1970)

A judge shall not exercise any power of appointment vested in him by law for his personal or financial advantage.

## Rule 70. Partisan Politics. (Adopted effective March 15, 1970)

A judge shall not (a) hold any official position or office in a political party, shall not serve on any party committee or act as a party leader, and shall not take part in political campaigns except when he is a candidate for elective judicial office; (b) become a candidate for a Federal, State or local non-
judicial elective office without first resigning his judgeship. A candidate for a judgeship shall not personally solicit or receive campaign contributions, but should establish some method which will not involve him in the direct solicitation of funds.

## Rule 71. Violation of Rules. (Amended effective October 1, 1971)

A judge who violates any of the preceding nine Rules shall be subject to discipline by the Illinois Courts Commission.

## Rules 72-75. Reserved

## Rule 76. Military Service of Judges. (New effective July 1, 1971)

A judge or associate judge may serve on active duty in the State militia or the armed forces of the United States for a period not to exceed 30 days in each year without loss of pay or vacation privileges and for a period not to exceed six months in any 24-month period without being disqualified from serving as a judge or associate judge.

## Committee Comments

(July 1, 1971)
This rule was adopted pursuant to the authority granted in section 13(b) of article VI of the new Illinois constitution to prescribe the periods of time that a judge or associate judge may serve in the State militia or armed forces of the United States without becoming disqualified from serving as a judge or associate judge.

## COURTS COMMISSION

Upon the recommendation of Roy O. Gulley, Administrative Director, acting as secretary to the Commission, the Illinois Courts Commission on February 13, 1970 requested the Attorney General to institute disciplinary proceedings against Cook County Circuit Judge Richard A. Napolitano. On March 19, 1970 a two count complaint was filed alleging violations of the Judicial Canons of Ethics, by Napolitano's involvement in obtaining large numbers of concessionaire contracts for the State Fair and his testimony before a Sangamon County Grand Jury investigating State Fair contracts.

After a full hearing on the charges, the Courts Commission ordered on July 14 that Judge Napolitano be removed from office as a circuit jjudge. The Commission held that the evidence was clear and convincing that Judge Napolitano's conduct constituted conduct unbecoming a judge and violated the Canons of Ethics adopted by the Illinois Judicial Conference.

Complaints self-initiated or received from citizens totaled 371 during 1970. Of this total, 159 were received from prisoners awaiting trial or sentenced to penal institutions. Investigations were commenced on complaints not considered frivolous or without
merit, the extent being governed by the validity of the charge related.

The Commission continued to hold monthly meetings, at which a review of all pending investigations was made by the secretary. Appropriate action was taken on these matters and new complaints, after a review and vote by the members.

Disgruntled litigants, both plaintiffs and defendants, continued to comprise the majority of complaints received by the Commission. Regardless of merit, a reply from the secretary to the Commission is sent to all.

## JUDICIAL CONFERENCE

Continuing its program of judicial education, the Illinois Judicial Conference conducted three seminars during the year.

The 1970 Judge Seminar, Magistrate Seminar, and New Judge Seminar were attended by over 600 judges.

Group discussion of the following topics were conducted:

## Judges

1. Selected topics of evidence
2. Sentencing and related problems
3. Court and jury relations
4. Problems in chancery
5. New developments in criminal law
6. Penal institutions and rehabilitation

## Magistrates

1. Problems in criminal cases
2. Miscellaneous procedures
3. Conduct of jury trials
4. Quasi-criminal and ordinance violations

## New Judge

1. Illinois judicial system
2. The trial and judges authority
3. Evidence
4. Criminal law with federal overtones
5. Judicial image
6. Pre-trial and post-trial procedures

Illinois Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert C. Underwood addressed the Conference and stated that in his opinion, "judging in the future will be a far more demanding task than it has been in the past. The restoration and the sustenance of public confidence in the courts will require the complete dedication of our time and talents to the performance of our judicial duties, if we are to regain and retain the degree of public trust which the judicial system must have if it is going to function effectively in our system of government."

He continued, "to the extent that the judicial system can remedy its own shortcomings, it ought to do so. To the extent that we leave undone that which we can do, we encourage not only criticism but also efforts by others to do that which would be better done by us. The independence and the integrity of the judicial branch of government will be respected in direct proportion to the fidelity with which we perform our duties."

The Conference was also addressed by the Hon. Luther M. Swygert, U. S. Court of Appeals, 7th Circuit, who discussed federal-state court relationships.
"You may be sure that federal judges are not reaching out to set aside state court convictions or even to review state court convictions; yet, they have two inescapable obligations: to ascertain if a state court prisoner has been afforded all his constitutional rights in accordance with federal standards; and to develop the facts if the record in the state court is inadequate for any reason.
"When we consider these obligations on the part of federal courts, I believe that you will agree that the federal judges and the state court judges have obligations which are not antagonistic, but which are indeed complementary, with full opportunity to accommodate the respective roles of state and federal judges in a dual and overlapping area of jurisprudence.
"We have heard a lot of talk lately about 'law and order.' We judges are often told that the function by the state courts would greatly reduce the number of cases in which federal courts are required to review the correctness of state criminal process.
"Lord Bryce, in The American Commonwealth expressed serious doubt that two judicial systems could exist side by side and not be in eternal conflict. I do not share that doubt, since I believe that, as co-guardians of constitutional rights, state and federal judges share equally the great responsibility commanded by the highest law of our land.
"The writ of habeas corpus is the ultimate safeguard of individual rights and should be viewed seriously, as such, by all our courts, state as well as federal."

## CONFERENCE OF CHIEF CIRCUIT JUDGES

The Conference of Chief Circuit Judges met twice during the Calendar Year 1970. The Conference considered methods by which Legislation adopted in the 76th General Assembly could be implemented on the Circuit level. The Conference approved minor changes in the Illinois Uniform Traffic Ticket and Complaints and re-established its Committee on Uniform Tickets to study extensive revisions of the Uniform Complaint Form.

As a result of discussion within the Conference, each Chief Judge conducted a review of the surety bonds maintained by each Clerk in his Circuit to determine whether the bonds were in amounts sufficient to cover losses which could result from negligence or wrong-doing on the part of Circuit Clerks. The responsibility of Clerks to take and retain large deposits in condemnation cases and court directed sales of valuable properties could render some bonds insufficient. Chief Judges participated in discussions concerning the role of the Judicial Branch of government in the 1970 Constitutional Convention and made recommendations for Amendments to Article 6 of the Constitution. Chief Judge John T. Reardon of Quincy was designated by the Supreme Court to serve as Chairman of the Supreme Court's Committee on the Constitutional Convention.

## The Administrative Office COURT REPORTERS

During Calendar Year 1970, the Administrative Office offered seven court reporter proficiency examinations. Three in Chicago, three at Normal, and one in Carbondale. A total of 114 candidates were tested resulting in certification of 40 additional Class A reporters. The Supreme Court authorized the appointment of 18 additional official court reporters in the Circuit Court of Cook County, bringing the total compliment of reporters in that Circuit to 135. Chief Judge John S. Boyle of the Circuit Court of Cook County implemented Public Act 761817 which authorized the appointment of an Administrator and Deputy Administrator for the Circuit Court's. Court Reporting Pool by appointing Leroy Hoskins CSR, as Administrator of the Cook County Reporting Pool and Patrick Piacenti CSR, as Deputy Administrator. In addition, Judge Boyle appointed administrators for four of the divisions within the Circuit. Mr. Albert Chapman CSR, was appointed as Administrator of the Criminal Division. Miss Sarah Walker CSR, was appointed Administrator of the Divorce Division. Mr. Jerome Miller CSR, was appointed Administrator of the Municipal District. Mr. Leonard Goldberg was appointed Administrator of the Juvenile Division.

## FISCAL

Expenditures of all money appropriated by the General Assembly to the Supreme Court are supervised by the Administrative Office. An accounting department, under a supervisor of accounts, prepares all payrolls, vouchers, and handles the details involved with the expenditure of funds. By court direction, the Director submits budgetary requirements for both the Administrative Office, Judicial Conference, and the other functions of the Supreme Court to be incorporated in the appropriations sub-
mitted to the legislature. The Director prepares the necessary legislation and appears before the Appropriations Committees of the General Assembly to obtain passage of the necessary bills to provide funds for operating the Court.

## IIMPARTIAL MEDICAL EXPERT RULE

Supreme Court Rule 215(d), as illustrated in the accompanying statistical summary, continues to be utilized on a selective basis. The trial courts are only ordering impartial medical examinations where in the opinion of the judge such an examination will materially aid in a just determination of the case.

The 1970 Statistical Summary set out in this report is self-explanatory, but several items should be noted: The fact that the number of impartial medical examinations (IME) exceeds the number of IME orders entered during 1969, is explained by considering that some orders provided for examinations of more than one party in the case and that one 1969 order resulted in an examination in 1970, although two 1970 orders provided for 1971 examinations.

Further, the IME panelists' average fee per examination includes costs ancillary to the examination, e.g., pathology, radiology, psychology, ete. However, where an IME physician used the services of another medical specialist, no recordation was made for the second physician's specialty unless his services were more than incidental to completing the examination.

## JUDICIAL STATISTICS

The most accurate method of determining a court system's effectiveness in the handling of its caseload is the compilation of statistics and their analysis. A trained statistician compiles the reports received from Cook County judges, court divisions and departments. Court statistics from outside Cook County are filed and compiled in the Springfield office from both judges and clerks.

Monthly reports showing the trend of all cases in Cook County are issued, and a quarterly report covers all circuits in the State.

## PUBLIC INFORMATION AND THE MEDIA

Inquiries regarding Illinois' courts from students, civic groups and media representatives continue to increase yearly as the judiciary remains a focus of nationwide attention.

The accomplishments made under our consolidated trial court system are constantly being examined by visiting court officials and judges from other states and foreign countries. In addition, a substantial num-
ber of requests for information is received via telephone and correspondence.

Information dissemination both oral and written to all of the above mentioned is now handled by the addition of an Assistant Director to the Administrative Office to act as public information officer with collateral administrative responsibilities.

## REPRESENTATION BY SUPERVISED SENIOR LAW STUDENTS

Supreme Court Rule 711 has now been in effect for a scant 19 months, and as evidenced by student participation, the Rule continues to be utilized to augment classroom learning with practical legal experiences. The licensees, under the supervision of a licensed attorney, represent persons who are financially unable to retain a private attorney, and they are employed by state and local government entities; e.g., office of the Attorney General and the offices of the various State's Attorneys.

In a poll of a very limited number of licensees, it was ascertained that licensees appear quite regularly in court in criminal and misdemeanor cases, forcible entry and detainer, administrative review, contract, various motions, juvenile matters, divorce, garnishment and housing cases. The range of legal matters handled by licensees as denoted by the poll would appear to indicate the licensees are deeply involved in the practice of law.

Many judges and licensees have offered favorable comments on the operation of the Rule. One licensee perhaps most cogently stated the effect of the Rule: "Supreme Court Rule 711 has made a valuable clinical educational experience available to a substantial number of Illinois law school students and has vastly improved the ability of legal aid clinics to provide necessary and otherwise unavailable services to the economically disadvantaged."

During 1970, an additional 251 law students have been certified and licensed, which is more than double the number of students licensed last year. The number of students and their law schools are as follows:

One licensee is employed by each of the following agencies: State's Attorneys of the counties of McLean, Henry, Peoria, Kankakee, Kane, Lake, Vermilion, Gallatin, Madison, Whiteside ; Public Defenders of the counties of Coles, Lake, Rock Island; Illinois General Assembly (Senate) ; Loyola University Graduate program ; and Illinois Department of Mental Health.
Nineteen licensees were employed by unknown agencies at the time their certificates were withdrawn. It should be noted that the total number of licensees employed exceeds the number of licensees since some were employed by more than one agency.

## CONCLUSION

The duties and responsibilities of the Administrative Office continue to increase as they have every year since its inception. Our installation of the Uniform Record Keeping System in offices of the circuit clerks continues, with 17 of the 101 downstate counties completed at the end of 1970. This effort has attained nation wide recognition. As more counties are added, our statistical gathering capabilities are enhanced and we are better able to evaluate the effectiveness of our administration of the system. Our staff has been increased with the addition of an Assistant Director who serves as a Public Information Officer together with other duties assigned to him.

With the Supreme Court assuming an ever increasing responsibility for the operation and supervision of the entire court system, I can foresee great demands being made upon the Administrative Office to assist the Chief Justice in his administrative duties. I am confident that we can meet the challenge.

## LAW DIVISION

There were a total of 16,721 law jury cases terminated in the Law Division during 1970. Of that total, 7,567 ( or $45.25 \%$ ) were cases which had been filed in 1965 or earlier; 5,478 (or $32.76 \%$ ) of those terminated were filed in 1968 or later.

There were 746 verdicts returned in the Law Division during 1970. The average time elapsed between the date on which such cases were filed and the date of verdict was 61.7 months. That interval is 1.5 months longer than it took similar cases to go to verdict in 1964, and 1 month longer than at the end of last year.

Effective July 1, 1970, Supreme Court Rule 295(i) was amended to allow magistrates to hear and decide civil actions in which the damages claimed do not exceed $\$ 15,000$. Implementing that expanded assignability to magistrates, the circuit court in September of 1970 transferred all law cases in which the ad damnum was between $\$ 10,000$ and $\$ 15,000$ out of the Law Division, and into Municipal District No. 1.
Some minor discrepancies still exist between the report of the cases transferred out of the Law Division and the report of the cases received in the First District. The following summary of those reports reveals those discrepancies:

The Clerks' year-end report shows a net reduction of 3,329 from the 41,931 law jury cases pending at the close of 1969. By termination and transfer during 1970, that figure has been reduced to 36,196 . At the close of 1969 the Municipal Department reported a total of 15,076 pending law jury cases. The attached report shows that the inventory of pending law jury cases in the Municipal Department has risen to 17,482 . However, this increase is more than accounted for by the addition of 4,629 law jury cases transferred from the Law Division into the First District.

At the close of 1969, we offered the opinion that the number of cases over 5 years old which are pending at the beginning of any given year probably has
a material effect on the average delay experienced during the year. The following chart tends to reconfirm that opinion:

## THE MUNICIPAL DEPARTMENT

The Municipal Department disposed of 12,999 law jury cases in 1970. The majority of those cases, or $51.2 \%$, were less than 2 years old. Only $0.3 \%$ were five years old or older. The breakdown of the age of law jury cases disposed of in 1970 are given in the following table:

The sharp increase in the number of law jury cases 5 years old and older pending in the Municipal Department is due to a transfer of 384 five year old law jury cases from the Law Division. However, it
may also reflect the fact that only 377 cases in the Municipal Department reached a verdict in 1970, compared with 534 in 1969.

## CHANCERY DIVISION

The number of pending Chancery cases more than doubled during the year. On January 1, 1970 there were 3,531 Chancery cases pending, and by the end of the year there were 7,706 cases. This sharp increase is due primarily to the rapid growth in the number of new "Housing'" cases seeking the demolition (or placement into receivership) of buildings in violation of the building codes. Well over 8,000 housing cases were filed in 1970, compared with less than 4,000 the year before. At the same time, total terminations for the Chancery Division rose slightly in 1970 to 10,321 cases from 9,902 cases in 1969.

[^0]:    * ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER

    Our order of January 28, 1968, is hereby amended to read as follows:

    The verified statements of economic interests and relationships and lists of names of corporations or other businesses referred to in our Rule 68 shall be filed by all judges on or before June 1, 1970, and annually thereafter on or before March 31. Such statements and lists shall also be filed by every person who becomes a judge, within 30 days after assuming office. The form of such statements and lists shall be as provided by the Administrative Director of the Illinois Courts, and they shall contain all information required by Rule 68 and this order, including:

    1. Economic interests in excess of $\$ 1000$ of the judge and members of his immediate family (spouse and minor children residing with him) whether in the form of stocks, bonds, realty, equity or creditor interests in proprietorships or partnerships, or otherwise. Values need not be stated.
    2. The names of all creditors to whom amounts in excess of $\$ 1000$ are owed.
    3. A list of every office, directorship and salaried employment of the judge and members of his immediate family (spouse and minor children residing with him). However, offices, dirctorships, and salaried employments in not-for-profit entities need not be reported if compensation of less than $\$ 1000$ per year is being received.
    4. Pending cases in which the judge or members of his immediate family are parties in interest, and, to the extent known to the judge, pending cases in which an economic entity in which he or they have an interest is a party.
    5. Any fiduciary position, including executorships and trusteeships of the judge, his wife and any child residing with him.
    6. Any other economic interest or relationship of the judge and of members of his immediate family (spouse and children residing with him) which could create substantial conflicts of interest for him in his judicial capacity other than those listed in numbered paragraphs 1 through 5 hereof.

    The emphasis on recently filed cases helped to reduce the average age of pending law cases from 16.7 months in 1969 to 15.4 months in 1970. However, this improvement did not come at the expense of increased delays for the older pending cases. The average delay between date of filing and date of verdict decreased from 34.5 months in 1969 to 27.5 months in 1970. The First Municipal District enjoyed a further reduction in the delay between filing and verdict, dropping from an average delay of 42.8 to an average delay of only 39.0 months.

    The following table shows the relationship between the number of 5 year old Municipal Department law jury cases pending at the beginning of each year and the average delay between filing and verdict for the Municipal Department as a whole and the First District in particular:
