Names of the forms: Purpose of the forms: Types of cases the forms CAN be used for:	<ul> <li>Application for Waiver of Criminal and/or Traffic Court Assessments for Use in Cook County Only</li> <li>Order for Waiver of Criminal and/or Traffic Court Assessments for Use in Cook County Only</li> <li>To ask the court to excuse you from having to pay all or any part of the fee assessments in your case.</li> <li>Cook County Cases Only</li> <li>All criminal cases, including felony and misdemeanor cases.</li> <li>Traffic and petty offenses in Schedules 2, 6, 9, 10, and 13 of Article 15 of the Criminal and Traffic Assessment Act.</li> </ul>
Types of cases the forms CANNOT be used for:	All civil and juvenile cases and any fee assessments resulting from violations of the Illinois Vehicle Code in the schedules not listed above. If you need to ask for a fee waiver in a civil case, you can use the <i>Application for Waiver of Court Fees</i> form found here: <u>ilcourts.info/forms</u> .
Cost to File the forms:	None.
Special information or papers needed to complete the forms:	<ul> <li>You will need to know your income and expenses for the past 12 months. You also need to know the value of your belongings, including any real estate.</li> <li>If you are filling this form out on behalf of a minor, you will need that person's information.</li> <li>If you get public benefits, bring current proof of eligibility and a benefits statement from the agency providing the benefit when you file your forms.</li> <li>If you don't get public benefits, bring documents showing your income, value of belongings (including real estate) and expense information when you file your forms.</li> </ul>
Statutes and court rules covering the forms:	<ul> <li><u>725 ILCS 5/124A-20</u> and <u>705 ILCS 135/Article 15</u></li> <li><u>Illinois Supreme Court Rule 404</u></li> </ul>
