Notice of Appeal (Civil)

Name of form:	Notice of Appeal (Civil)
Purpose of the form:	To start the appeal of a trial court order or judgment.
Types of cases the form CAN be used for:	Civil cases where the trial court entered an order that can be appealed. A final order (which is generally one that ends the case) can be appealed.
Types of cases the form CANNOT be used for:	Criminal cases and cases where there is not an order that can be appealed.
Cost to file the form:	None.
Special information or papers needed to complete the form:	 The orders you want to appeal. Businesses other than sole proprietorships cannot represent themselves in the appellate court. Please talk to a lawyer.
Statutes and rules covering the form:	Illinois Supreme Court Rules 11, 12, 301, 303(b), 373
Where to find the form and instruction sheet:	illinoiscourts.gov/documents-and-forms/approved-forms
Where to get access to a computer and scanner to file and serve:	The trial clerk's office will have a computer and scanner where you can scan, save, and then use the computer to e-file and serve your document.
